1. Students should attend school all year. Shorter breaks in the school year provide big benefits in and out of school. With shorter breaks, students do not forget as much from the start of a vacation until the end. This lets teachers reduce review time and teach more new material. Short breaks also keep kids from getting bored the way they sometimes are by the end of a long vacation. Since they are not bored, they do not get into trouble as they look for new ways to fill time. In addition, a year-round schedule is more like a college or work schedule than a traditional school year. This helps older students move more easily from high school to the next phase of their lives. \_\_\_\_\_

For starters, America’s dependence on oil has major drawbacks. One problem is the reliance on foreign oil, a source that can dry up as a result of natural disaster or man-made decisions. Another problem is the environmental impact of burning this fossil fuel in its many forms—gasoline and home heating oil being two examples. Pollutants continue to be sent throughout our environment through the burning of oil.

Coal is another “dirty” source of power. It is needed to run electricity-generating plants. But it is more polluting than oil.
