Restating the Question	<u>on</u>	LA / Hour
We restate questions for two main reasons: 1) An accurate statement lets the reader or listener know what we are writing or talking about. 2) An accurate statement helps us remain clear on what we are writing or talking about.		
When we restate a question, we use almost every word from the question in our restatement. In the examples below, the words in common between each question and its restatement have been underlined.		
EXAMPLE 1: What month of the year is shortest? The month of the year that is shortest is February . (OR) February is the month of the year that is shortest. (OR) February is the shortest month of the year.		
EXAMPLE 2: How many <u>ways can you eat a Reese's Peanut Butter Cup</u>? I <u>can eat a Reese's Peanut Butter Cup</u> twelve <u>ways</u> .		
EXAMPLE 3: <u>In the story "Little Red Riding Hood,"</u> who is the most intelligent character? In the story "Little Red Riding Hood," the most intelligent character is the wolf. (OR) The wolf is the most intelligent character in the story "Little Red Riding Hood."		
EXAMPLE 4: Why <u>are people concerned about global warming</u> ? People are concerned about global warming because of the consequences it will have on human existence.		
EXAMPLE 5: Who will stop the rain? No one will stop the rain. (OR) The rain will be stopped by no one.		
When we restate a question, the words that are replaced are often <i>who</i> , <i>what</i> , <i>where</i> , <i>when</i> , <i>why</i> , <i>how</i> , and phrases that those words begin (such as <i>who else</i> , <i>what happens</i> , <i>how often</i> , <i>how much</i> , and <i>how many</i>). We also change words. <i>You</i> can become <i>I</i> , for example, as in Example 2. Verb forms may change, as in Example 5.		
If you are having trouble restating a sentence, try doing it in two steps. 1) First, restate the question using ALL of the words. Let's restate Example 2 using every word: "You can eat a Reese's Peanut Butter Cup how many ways." This does not make perfect sense, and so it should point to where changes need to be made. 2) Second, replace the parts that keep the sentence from saying what you want it to say: "I can eat a Reese's Peanut Butter Cup twelve ways."
