- All copies must be typed (single-spaced) using a 12-point font. The only
 acceptable fonts are Garamond, Arial, Times New Roman, and Courier. You must be
 able to send your files electronically, <u>but only send the drafts that Mr. Fisher
 requests</u>. Some drafts must be printed and submitted on paper. Limited computer
 time during class may be made available to you. Additional computer time before
 school, during lunch, and/or after school can be scheduled.
- Your story must be at least 300 words long (about one-half of a typed page) but may be as long as necessary to tell your <u>short</u> story. Mr. Fisher may put limits on ideas that are too complex for the short-story format.
- 3. You will be required to confer with other students about their papers. Others will confer with you about your paper.
- 4. You may be required to edit the stories of other students for spelling, punctuation, and grammar. Efforts will be made to keep the identities of authors and editors private from each other, but this is not a guarantee.
